In a nutshell

Take a look at what happens to our model boat when a large bubble of gas is released from below.

What to do

Press the button when it is lit and the boat is visible at the top of the tube to release a large bubble of gas.

Time Required

KS3 & KS4 2 minutes per student.

What's happening?

It has long been known that large pockets of methane gas are trapped below the ocean floor. These pockets can be released if disturbed or if the pressure becomes too large. When the released gas reaches the surface it could cause a large area of bubbling low density froth. A ship would not be able to float in this lower density fluid and so would sink.

A trawler discovered resting in a large methane crater off the east coast of Scotland is believed to have sunk because of this phenomenon and this could also account for why so many ships disappeared in the 'Bermuda Triangle'.
