# **Tornado**

### Location

First floor, Curiosity zone exhibition

#### In a nutshell

Visit our portable tornado maker to see the movement of air in a tornado.

### What to do

See the movement of the air in a tornado; use your arm to see how objects affect the tornado.

## **Time Required**

KS3 & KS4 2-3 minutes per student.

## What's happening?

A tornado is a violently rotating column of air, spinning whilst in contact with both the surface of the Earth and the base of a cumulonimbus or cumulus cloud. A tornado can pick up debris and dust that can add to the damage they cause. Most tornados have wind speeds of less than 180 km/h (110 mph) and have a diameter of approximately 80m travelling for several kilometres before dissipating but the most extreme can reach speeds of 480km/h (300 mph) with diameters over 3km travelling more than 100km before dissipating. A tornado is not always visible but due to the low pressure caused by high wind speeds, water vapour in the air usually condenses into cloud droplets making the tornado visible. Tornadoes are most common in spring and least common in winter, but tornadoes can occur any time of year that favorable conditions occur.
