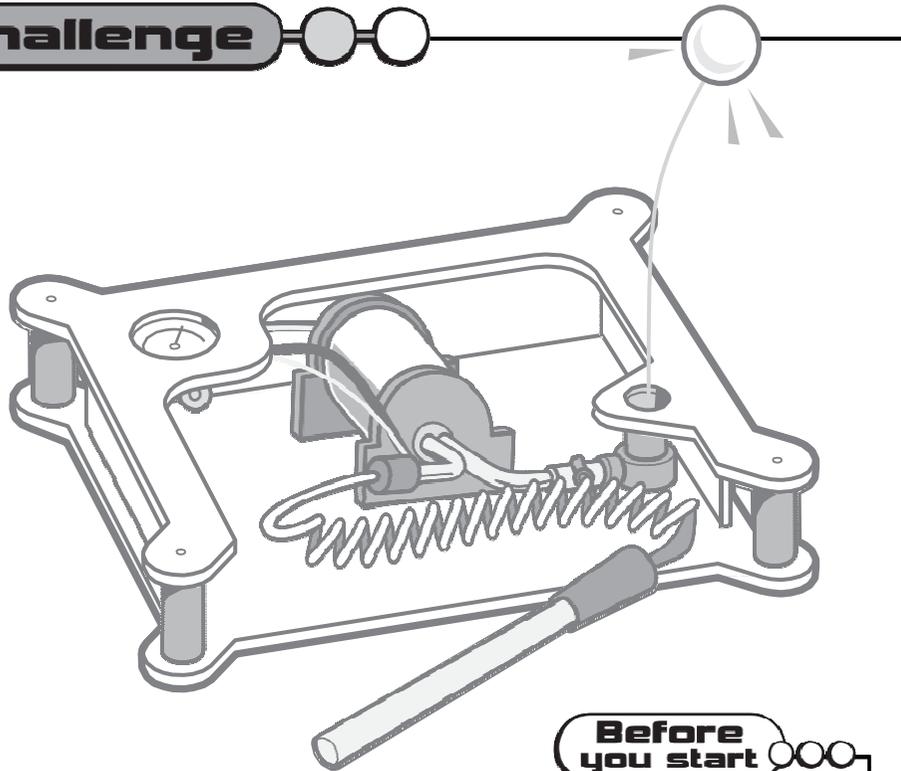


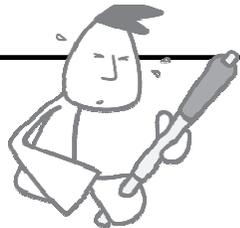
# UNDER PRESSURE

Your challenge for this exhibit is to work out how pressure makes things move - in this case the ball.


### Think about.

Pump the hand pump until the dial on the gauge reaches a pressure of 1.0 bar. Put the ping pong ball in the clear plastic tube. Open the launch valve and watch what happens.

2. Can you think of examples of how we use high pressure gas or liquid?

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
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

3. What is happening as you use the exhibit?  
Put the following statements in order in the boxes below

- A. Air travels down the launch tube and exerts a force on the ping pong ball.
- B. The one-way valve prevents it escaping.
- C. Opening the launch valve releases the pressure
- D. The ping pong ball is pushed into the air.
- E. The pump forces air into the storage tank.
- F. As more air is pumped in it becomes compressed and pressure builds up.

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

# UNDER PRESSURE

## 8. Pressure is a force applied over a particular area.

The force of the compressed air has raised the ball off the ground – increasing its gravitational potential energy (GPE)

### Calculate the change in gravitational potential energy of the ball

using the information provided and the data you collected for a pressure of 1bar.

**GPE gained = m x g x h**, where:

GPE = gravitational potential energy in joules (J)

m = mass in kilogrammes (kg)

g = gravitational field strength (**10 m/s<sup>2</sup>**)

h = height in metres (m)

Mass of ball = 5g

$$\text{GPE} = m \times g \times h$$

$$\text{GPE} = \quad \times \quad \times$$
